



THURSDAY: Workshop 1 9:00 – 9:50

ADD SPICE TO YOUR READING INSTRUCTION. (EL) Dr. Tammie Jacobs. Variety is the spice of life! Add spice to how you teach reading by using a variety of good teaching methods instead of doing the same thing every day. BF CEU O 22-01-01

BUOYANCY AND STEM. (*UEL, MS, HS*) *Dr. Orlando Buria.* What is your school doing to implement STEM (Science-Technology-Engineering-Mathematics) education in its classes? Each participant in this workshop will conduct a fascinating STEM hands-on investigation of the properties of buoyancy and their application. The experiment is designed to incorporate teamwork to evoke analytical thinking through use of the scientific method. READING ASSESSMENT – HOW AND WHY YOU SHOULD ASSESS YOUR STUDENTS' READING. (*EL, SEC, GEN*). *Lisa Joyner*. TEACHING CRITICAL THINKING. (*EL, MS, HS, PRI*) *Dr. Lesa Carper.* All teachers want their students to be able to transfer the knowledge and skills learned in their classes to the problems and situations in life. Research demonstrates that this type of transfer does not occur unless the students are taught specifically how to do so. Students need to think in terms of concepts, connections, and hands-on (or brains-on) engagement. The types of activities and teaching strategies we use in our classes affect our students' thinking abilities. WHAT ARE THE SIGNS OF CHILD ABUSE AND CHILD NEGLECT? (*GEN*) *Ian Thompson*. AMAZING FOLDSCOPES AND HOW TO USE THEM. (*EL*, *UEL*, *MS*, *HS*) *Dr. Orlando Buria.* Do you want all of your students to be able to probe the amazing complexity of the microscopic world of God's creation? Then, learn how to build a Foldscope! This instrument is an optical microscope that can be assembled from a punched sheet of <u>cardstock</u>, a spherical glass lens, a <u>light-emitting diode</u> and a diffuser panel, along with a watch battery that powers the LED. \square COVE \blacklozenge CEU \bigcirc 22-02-01

ATTRACTING ATTENTION AND KEEPING IT (GRADES K-6). (*EL*) Kim Smith. Gaining the student's attention is the easy part. Keeping that attention throughout the lesson is often the difficulty. BUILDING A SUCCESSFUL PHONICS LESSON (FOUR- AND FIVE-YEAR-OLD KINDERGARTEN). (EC) Charity Kerr. One of the greatest privileges of a kindergarten teacher is to open up the world of reading to her students. In this session, you will learn how to effectively use the six steps of phonics that give your students the tools they need to become successful readers. I will provide you with an overview of the Iowa and CogAT Assessments. I will explore the benefits and features of both assessments. This is not limited to the public school establishment. However, objectively, this is not the case. The education systems of many countries regularly exceed ours. We shall also look at our Christian school academics, for "quality academics" are not assured by utilizing Christian textbooks and employing personable, born-again Christian faculty and enrolling "college prep" students. THURSDAY: Workshop 3 12:40 – 1:30

CHALLENGING GIFTED AND TALENTED CHILDREN. (*EL, SEC, GEN*) Lisa Joyner. Is she just well-behaved and motivated to please or is she gifted? Is he bored or badly behaved or is he gifted? What does "gifted and talented" actually mean? Identifying and meeting the needs of these students is just as important as meeting the unique needs of students who have disabilities. Learn ways to challenge the potential of the gifted child. GOD'S WAY, OR MAN'S WAY? *(GEN) Mike Snavely.* Sometimes caught between what we hear at home (and in church) and what is being taught in school, students need to understand why the Bible is, in fact, totally trustworthy. This session includes some pertinent issues related to the dubious nature of the evolution model and what is taught regarding the age of the earth, contrasted with various evidences which increase our confidence that what God says is reliable. \square BF \blacklozenge CEU \bigcirc 22-03-05

HISTORY THROUGH EYES OF FAITH. (*MS*, *HS*, *ADM*) *Dr. Bryan Smith*. Christians in general agree that the Bible is essential to understanding history. But what is this supposed to look like in the classroom? Many teachers focus on godly character traits seen in the lives of certain individuals. But this approach often leaves the core objectives of history unaffected by biblical teaching. This session proposes that the key to effective biblical integration is Christian worldview shaping. Students learn Christianly when they see the past through the lens of a Christian worldview. Yet these God-honoring traits are not always easily instilled into students. DIRECTION AND CHORAL TECHNIQUES, PART 1. (SEC) Dr. Phil Gingery with Dr. David Ledgerwood. NEUTRALITY IS NEGATION: THE BURDEN OF PROOF IN THE DEFENSE OF THE FAITH. (GEN) Dr. Michael Riley. All too often, both defenders and skeptics of Christianity assume that, in a discussion of the truth of Christianity, the Christian apologist alone carries the burden of proof. If the Christian can't prove his position, the unbeliever is justified to continue in his unbelief. But unbelief (in all its forms) is also a position; it is not neutral. Calling on the unbeliever to give an account for his own worldview is one of the most potent – and neglected – tools in the apologist's toolbox. \square RF \blacklozenge CEU \bigcirc 22-04-06

PROFESSIONAL TRAINING IN THREAT/VIOLENCE ASSESSMENT – PART 1. (PAS, ADM, GEN) Ian Thompson. What do you do if an elementary student repeatedly draws pictures where he/she is extremely violent to others? When a teen appears to threaten violent actions against others? When a parent becomes "uncontrollable" at a ball game? When an "outsider" who acts peculiarly comes to a church service? Is there a real threat, or not? In this session we will cover the content that is part of training by the FBI, State Police, school safety Act 67, and Pennsylvania's higher education system. We will make application to our school/church situations. The presenter is a certified trainer with this content. (The first of a two-hour session. TEACH READING AND WRITING DURING SOCIAL STUDIES AND SCIENCE. (*EL, MS*) *Dr. Tammie Jacobs.* How do you use your science and social studies textbooks? Do your students just answer a list of questions after they take turns reading it aloud or reading it for homework? Do your students just write a report about a famous explorer or scientist? Come learn a few tips for the developing reading skills and writing skills while teaching in the content areas. \square PBB \blacklozenge CEU \bigcirc 22-04-08

TEACH WRITING WHEN YOU TEACH WRITING. (UEL, MS, HS) Dr. Lesa Carper. Teaching writing and teaching grammar are two different aspects of content (as are teaching algebra and geometry or physics and biology). Learn how to teach writing to students so that both the students and the teachers (and not just the English teachers) have a common and understood "writing language." TEACHING FROM AND FOR A BIBLICAL WORLDVIEW. (GEN) Dr. Bryan Smith. Understanding a biblical worldview is essential if we're going to teach Christianly. But to shape the hearts and minds of young people, we need more than knowledge. We need skill, too. In this session we will discuss the goals, plans, and tools we can use to develop a biblical worldview in students. \square PBA \blacklozenge CEU \odot 22-04-10

TESOL SEMINARS, SESSION I: GENERAL TESOL PRINCIPLES. *(GEN) Abbey Kilbride.* "TESOL is an acronym that stands for Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages. It refers to teaching English to non-native English speakers either abroad or in English-speaking countries, though it is most often used to refer to language instruction that occurs in English-speaking countries." (International TEFL Academy) TESOL is increasingly important in our schools and churches as we have an increased number of individuals seeking attendance who are not native English speakers, and/or are not native to the church/school subculture (which can even include many "English speakers" in our own communities). A knowledge of TESOL principles heightens the prospect of attracting and retaining families and individuals who are otherwise more prone to not attend or "drop out" – which blocks our opportunities to minister to their spiritual, social, emotional, and academic needs. COMBINED CLASS SEMINARS: SESSION II: LIGHTENING THE LOAD. (EL) Dr. Mae Dunckley. Combined class teachers carry a heavy load, but there are ways to make it easier. MAKING PHONICS LESSONS ENGAGING. (EC) Lois Carper. Letters, sounds, blending, decoding, and encoding can seem so crucial, yet overwhelming, for the youngest learners! How can we engage and even excite little students during phonics lessons?
